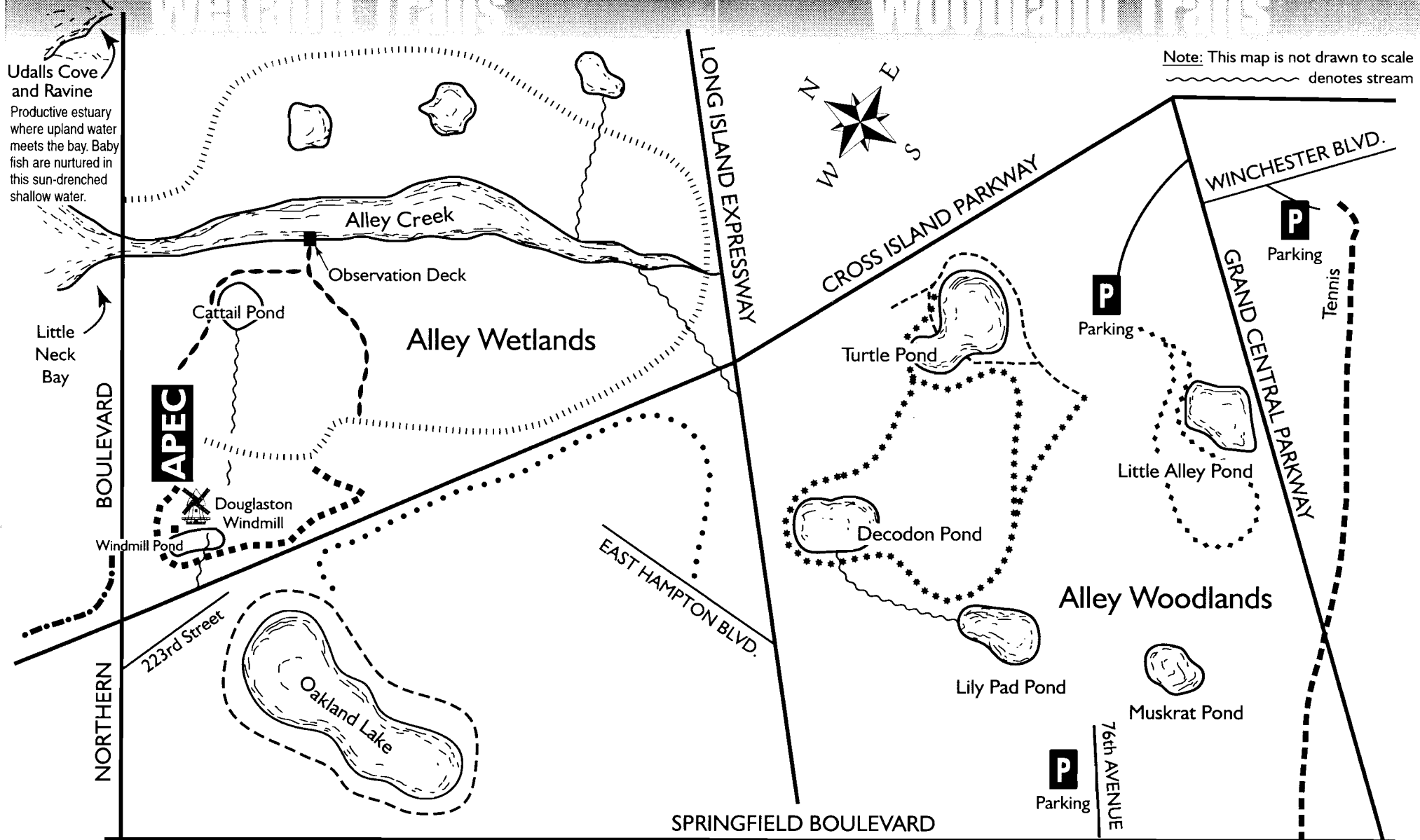

- CATTAIL POND TRAIL - .25 mile Alley Creek, marsh and fill. Platform allows observation of fresh water pond. Deck leads out onto Alley Creek for viewing.
- . - . - . JOE MICHAELS MEMORIAL MILE and CROSS ISLAND BIKE PATH - 2.75 miles Flat ribbon between parkway and Little Neck Bay. First overpass heading North enters Crocheron Park.
- OAKLAND LAKE and RAVINE - 1 mile Level walk circles deep glacial kettle, the only black bass population in Queens County.
- ..... PITOBIK TRAIL - 1.8 miles Easy walk along the edge of salt and fresh water marsh. Area of historical importance.
- ..... TULIP TREE TRAIL - 1 mile Hike along forested hillside of native hardwoods. Largest tulip tree on Long Island.
- ..... WINDMILL TRAIL - Circles APEC's newest pond.

- ..... RED OAK TRAIL - .5 mile Inter-relationships in nature; tall oak acorns provide food for animals. Squirrels leave a cache of nuts to mature into a canopy of trees.
- TURTLE POND TRAIL - .5 mile Forest meets pond . . . two habitats. Forest provides cover and food. Pond provides water, different plant foods and a buffet of insects. Fringe areas offer wildlife the best of two worlds.
- . - . - . VANDERBILT MOTOR PARKWAY - 2.25 miles Bike or walk this parkway built by William K. Vanderbilt who wanted to provide easy access to his country estate in Deepdale and for racing his motorcars.
- ..... YELLOW DOT TRAIL - 1 mile Spring-fed glacial kettle ponds display stages of succession. Forest is a haven for small animals and birds. Winter - a wonderland of snow covered hills and valleys, Spring and Summer - an array of wildflowers and berry-laden shrubs, Fall - a harvest of mushrooms and color.
